

Slum Reconstruction Project for Flood-Affected Families, Pimpri (1997)

Background

In 1997, severe flooding affected several informal settlements in the Pimpri area, causing significant damage to houses and disrupting the lives of vulnerable slum-dwelling families. To address the housing needs of the affected community, the Pimpri-Chinchwad Municipal Corporation (PCMC) initiated a Slum Reconstruction Project aimed at providing safe and sustainable housing solutions for flood-affected residents.

Recognizing the importance of community participation in the successful implementation of rehabilitation programs, PCMC entrusted MASHAL (Maharashtra Social Housing and Action League) with the responsibility of mobilizing and engaging the affected communities throughout the reconstruction process.

Project Implementation by MASHAL

MASHAL played a key role in facilitating community participation and ensuring that the reconstruction initiative reflected the needs, aspirations, and priorities of the affected families.

The primary objectives of MASHAL's intervention were:

- To create awareness among slum residents regarding the reconstruction scheme.
- To provide detailed information and build understanding about the proposed rehabilitation process.
- To motivate and organize community members for active participation in planning and implementation.
- To strengthen communication and coordination between the municipal authorities and the affected residents.
- To promote a participatory approach to housing development and community rehabilitation.

Community Mobilization and Participation

MASHAL conducted extensive community outreach activities, including meetings, consultations, group discussions, and awareness sessions with flood-affected households. These interactions enabled residents to understand the project objectives, express their concerns, and actively contribute to decision-making processes.

Through continuous engagement, MASHAL fostered trust among community members and encouraged their meaningful involvement in the planning and execution of the reconstruction initiative.

Participatory Planning and Design

In addition to its social mobilization efforts, MASHAL provided technical and architectural support for the project. The organization undertook a detailed assessment of community needs and aspirations through extensive consultations with affected families.

Based on these interactions, MASHAL developed a comprehensive architectural design proposal that incorporated the preferences, living patterns, and future requirements of the residents. The design process emphasized:

- Community-centered planning
- Functional and safe housing layouts
- Improved living conditions
- Sustainable reconstruction approaches
- Long-term resilience against future disasters

The participatory design approach ensured that the proposed housing solutions were not only technically sound but also socially acceptable and responsive to community needs.

Key Achievements

Through this initiative, MASHAL successfully:

- Mobilized flood-affected communities for active participation in the reconstruction process.

- Created awareness and understanding of the rehabilitation scheme among residents.
- Facilitated dialogue between local authorities and affected families.
- Conducted extensive community consultations and needs assessments.
- Developed comprehensive architectural designs based on residents' aspirations and requirements.
- Promoted a people-centered and participatory approach to post-disaster housing reconstruction.

Impact
